KPK POLKA BOX VIRTUAL INSTRUMENT



Installation: Unzip the downloaded file and put the KPK Polka Box folder wherever you typically store your Kontakt instruments on your computer. If you plan on downloading more than one Polkasound Productions virtual instrument, I recommend making a “Polkasound Productions” folder exclusively for them. For example:

- 📁 Local Drive (C:)
 - 📁 My Kontakt Instruments
 - 📁 Polkasound Productions
 - 📁 KPK Polka Box

To play the instrument in Kontakt, on the left side of the Kontakt window, select the Files tab. Navigate to the KPK Polka Box folder on your computer and load either the .nki file for either the right hand or the left hand.

Right Hand:

The Right Hand offers both the master reeds sound and the high reeds (three clarinets) sound. Use the red keyswitches to toggle between the sets of reeds. There are also two reed select sound effects an octave above the keywitches.

Left Hand:

The Left Hand of the KPK Polka Box is made up of five different zones on the keyboard: the basses, major chords, minor chords, dominant 7th chords, and diminished chords. Only one reed set is offered for the left side.

The Envelopes: Attack and Release

Attack adjusts how quickly a note will sound when you press a key, and *Release* adjusts how long a note “hangs on” after you let go of the key. For the most natural accordion sound, I recommend setting the envelopes to the approximate values below:

Right Hand: Attack: 10ms Release: 15ms
Left Hand: Attack: 25ms Release: 35ms

Reverb:

This adjustment lets you add some pleasing hall acoustics to your instrument.

Getting the Most Realism Out of Your Virtual Instrument:

A real accordion is a wind-driven instrument. All notes played at one time will have the same volume, and that volume is dependent on how much pressure is being exerted on the bellows. To make your accordion parts sound more realistic, make the velocities of all the notes the same, and add dynamics by continually adjusting the volume of the whole instrument.

The .nki files without the “MW” designation are velocity sensitive, meaning how hard you play determines how loud each note is. After you record your parts, you may want to edit the velocities of all the notes so that they are the same, and then open a controller lane in your DAW and edit the volume data to add dynamics to your performance.

The .nki files designated with “MW” use the modulation wheel controller on your keyboard to control the instrument’s volume in real time.
